

**“TOWARDS A EUROPEAN URBAN AGENDA”.**  
**First Progress Report**  
**on the Follow up of the Toledo Declaration**  
**and other common actions.**

**Presented and agreed on**  
**at the Ghent DG Meeting**  
**(2010 12 14)**

## Introduction:

The Toledo Declaration included some strategic statements to address the current urban challenges in European cities and to implement the Europe 2020 strategy by achieving a smarter, more sustainable and socially inclusive urban development.

In Part A of the Declaration, the Ministers agreed in particular on:

- The suitability of the integrated approach in urban development policies and the need for a common understanding of it.
- The importance of integrated urban regeneration and its strategic potential for a smarter, more sustainable and socially inclusive urban development in Europe.

The Ministers expressed their commitment to promote this two strategic statements both at European level and at national level, within the framework of their respective competencies, and when relevant given the context of each Member State

Part B of the Declaration was about supporting the continuation of the Marseille process and the implementation of the European Reference Framework for Sustainable Cities (RFSC).

Part C of the Declaration was about the need to strengthen intergovernmental coordination between successive Presidencies and cooperation with the European Commission and other EU institutions and organizations with the aim of consolidating and shaping a joint working programme or 'European Urban Agenda', which will have to mature gradually before taking its final shape.

As a preliminary outline of this joint work programme, the Ministers undertook to encourage and support the following joint actions, summarized below:

**ACTIONS FOR IMPLEMENTATION:**

Development of the tool by the Second Phase of the MS/I WG, with the technical assistance of CERTU and the feedback from the LC FACIL and Cities' Testing results.

- Testing Phase:

Selection of cities by the UDG.

Launching event of the Testing Phase.

Testing Phase conducted by a joint leadership of France, the Council Presidency, CEMR and the Commission (DG REGIO).

- Political decisions:

Coordination between project development and validation at UDG: RFSC Steering Committee.

Overall supervision and validation of steps undertaken: UDG (as the RFSC Monitoring Committee).

Final approval of the tool at DG or Informal Ministerial meeting (2011).

- Promotion and dissemination at national level:

Pre-selection of cities for the testing phase: deadline October 4, 2010.

Translation of the final tool, expected by the end of 2011.

**TIMEFRAME:**

- Final development of the RFSC tool:

The first phase (July 2010 / November-December 2010) is to integrate the comments of LCFACIL cities on usability as well as on the content of the tool and complete the missing parts in the prototype (V0). It should result in a consolidated version (V1) to be translated into European languages (at the expense of Member States) to be used in the tests with European cities.

The second phase (January 2011 / October-November 2011) will be dedicated to enhancing the tool (expand the "indicators": completing the list taking into account the experience of cities and documentation files) and to incorporating the results of the tests conducted among European cities (see below).

- Testing Phase:

This task will consist of a test with 50 to 70 cities representing different cities and towns in Europe on the content and uses the framework. Their findings will be incorporated in the final version (V2) of the tool, which will be distributed to, and appropriated by, all European cities.

In the first phase (July to December 2010) there will be a selection of the candidate cities (mobilization of Member States, call for proposals within each Member State, national panel proposal, final selection of 50 to 70 cities in Europe), as well as of the provider responsible for organizing and running tests (who will propose the general organization, prepare the questionnaires, support the test cities and towns and process the outputs of the test). (Note: the European tender to find this service provider was launched on July 17, 2010 by the

Commission and the deadline for the call was September 15, 2010). The roadmap of this phase and the selection of cities will be presented at the Liège Conference (December 2, 2010), at the Ghent Directors-General meeting (December 14, 2010), and finally at the Launching Event scheduled for February 2011.

The second phase will focus on the actual testing and integration of its results into the tool and the users' guide. In addition to the content of the RFSC (questionnaire, interactions, indicators) and detailed functionalities (diagnostic tools, support in the formalization of a strategy, evaluation and monitoring), the testing will review the architecture of the RFSC tool and its functionalities. The purpose is to agree on the basic elements (set at European level) and those who are at the discretion of each user. More generally, this will also allow assessing the added value for cities of certain functions like sharing of good practices and indicators and linking sister-cities.

**ACTION 2. STRENGTHENING THE URBAN DIMENSION IN COHESION POLICY.**

TOLEDO DECLARATION COMMITMENT:

*"The Ministers agreed on their wish to collaborate with the European Commission in the debate on the consideration of and the elaboration for a strengthened framework for the urban dimension in Cohesion Policy in the next programming period.*

*The Ministers agreed that the common basis of the new framework of the urban dimension in Cohesion Policy should be the following principles: the involvement of local authorities and the cities in the design and implementation of the Operational Programmes, a stronger emphasis on the integrated approach and sustainable urban development, a stronger focus on territorial and social cohesion, and a simplified delivery system". Results expected from the Urban Development DGs meeting:

1) The DGs responsible for the Urban Development support a smooth and formal cooperation between the Territorial and the Urban Agendas, welcome the bridge built between the NTCCP Core Group and the UDG Contact Group, and ask for regular reports on their joint activities.

2) Consultation (UDG) and information (Urban Development DG meeting – due to the agenda) of the Urban actors before its adoption are important to increase the weight of the new TA

3) Consultation of the Territorial actors (NTCCP and DG TA meeting) before its adoption are important to increase the weight of the new Urban Agenda

4) A common communication tool would be a good way to share information between the UDG and NTCCP groups. This point could be further explored in view of the first joint NTCCP core group and UDG contact group meeting in Budapest (09 February 2010, between the NTCCP meeting of 09 February 2010 and the UDG meeting of 10 and 11 February 2010)

**ACTION 4. CONTINUING TO PROMOTE RESEARCH, COMPARATIVE STUDIES AND STATISTICS, EXCHANGE OF BEST PRACTICES AND DISSEMINATION OF KNOWLEDGE ON URBAN TOPICS, AND STRENGTHENING COORDINATION OF THEM ALL.**

**TOLEDO DECLARATION COMMITMENT:**

*"The Ministers considered it to be key to continue to promote research, comparative studies and statistics on urban topics, in addition to exchanging best practices and dissemination of knowledge.*

*To do this will require coordination and driving research programmes more vigorously on a national scale and transnational projects on a European scale. In this regard, the European Commission is thanked for driving the European Research Area on urban topics by supporting urban research through the Framework Programmes for RTD in a considerable way and especially by funding the URBAN-NET network. It would be extremely useful to continue beyond 2010 on the path begun by URBAN-NET to coordinate transnational research programmes on urban topics and the intergovernmental funding of calls for transnational projects, and also extend the number of participating countries. The Ministers also asked the Commission to consider the urban dimension within the Seventh Framework Programme currently in effect, and stressed the importance to continue supporting it in the future. Finally, they also asked the Commission and national authorities involved to strengthen the analysis of the territorial dimension of urban dynamics within the ESPON Programme.*

*In the light of the recommendations from Portugal's report presented at Leipzig on the need for stronger cooperation between knowledge providers, the Ministers took note of the progress that has been made in the cooperation between the European urban networks, and also between intergovernmental and Commission initiatives, particularly welcoming the envisaged creation of a Common Search Engine between EUKN and URBACT Programme. The Ministers also welcomed the commitment of several Member States to continue their participation in EUKN for the 2011-2015 period and valued their efforts to establish EUKN as an EGTC.*

*Finally, the Ministers stressed the need to reinforcing all these initiatives and welcomed Sweden, Spain and Belgium's initiative to set up a working group associated with the UDG to look into the possibilities and define the strategies to foster coordination and reflection on these topics related to urban research and knowledge".*

**DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:**

- a. Coordinate and facilitate the flow of information between Urban Development (UD) policy making and Urban Research (UR) policy making, programming and funding.
- b. Facilitate the process of building the European Research Area (ERA) in the field of urban development, by facilitating intergovernmental coordination: joint programming and joint funding of research calls at transnational level.
- c. Influence EU key Research Programmes and dossiers in order to assure the correct allocation of urban issues and the continuity of EU funding in the future.
- d. Facilitate the flow of information from knowledge-makers to knowledge dissemination points, and the feed of knowledge dissemination points with best practices.
- e. Facilitate the flow of information between informal and applied urban research at local level and local decision making: Local-Urban (City) Knowledge Arenas.

**ACTIONS FOR IMPLEMENTATION:**

**TOLEDO DECLARATION COMMITMENT:**

*The Ministers considered that existing coordination instruments have to be re-inforced and the development of new instruments for integrated and sustainable urban policies have to be explored at all levels of governance: local, regional, national and European. At the urban level, the RFSC will offer a useful tool to support an integrated approach. At regional and national levels, existing coordination structures should be used more intensively and the possibilities of new coordination instruments explored in order to move towards an integrated approach in urban policies. As mentioned above, at European level, cooperation between Member States, European institutions, and cities’ associations and networks should also be reinforced.*

*To this end, on Spain, Belgium and Hungary’s initiative, the possibility of developing methods to address and follow up the implementation of the Leipzig Charter at all levels of governance will be explored from the second half of 2010 onwards”. (Toledo Declaration, page VIII)*
